






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MOON TOWNSHIP NEW RESIDENT GUIDE

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Welcome!

On behalf of over 27,000 and growing, residents, I wish to welcome you to Moon Township, Allegheny County, Pennsylvania! The community of Moon is known for its excellent schools, quality of life, active community, and strategic location.

As Moon continues to grow residentially and commercially, the Township also continues to review and expand what we have to offer to the residents. Currently, Moon residents enjoy three spectacular parks and over 600 acres of green space. Our largest park, Moon Park is where most of the activities take place. With two baseball fields, a softball field, three soccer fields, basketball, tennis, pickleball, and sand volleyball courts, Clearview Federal Splashpad, five pavilions, an amphitheater, and the Miracle League Facility, there is always something for all ages. Added in 2022 Black Dog Winery Dog Park to open to canines and their families in the summer of 2023.

Moon Senior Connection is a thriving group of over 400 members. Seniors from Moon and surrounding areas are invited to become a member and join in on the daily activities including, arts & crafts, music, exercise classes, cards, bingo, lunches, and the occasional adventure out to local exhibits. Tapestry Senior Living located at 550 Cherrington Parkway is home of Moon Senior Connection Program which operates Monday through Fridays.

Annually, the Board of Supervisors allocates funds for to road improvements and improvements to the Township facilities. In 2023, Township will wrap up renovation projects at Downes Fire Station, 1900 Beaver Grade Road, Township Municipal Center, 1000 Beaver Grade Road, Sister Rene Procopio Schoolhouse Activity Center, 120 Mooncrest Drive and Black Dog Winery Dog Park, 1845 Beaver Grade Road. However, construction on the new Moon Township Police Department will begin in March of 2023 with completion expected in the fall of 2024.


The Moon Area School District continues to receive acclamations for the education it provides for the students and Robert Morris University since opening the UPMC Event Center has brought entertainment options for all ages to this region.

While we look forward to a bright future, we always remember our history. The story is that settlers arriving in what is today the western portion of Allegheny County named the region "Moon" after the crescent-shaped curvature of the Ohio River. From men like John Meek, Robert Loudon, and John Vail, who received the first land grants that eventually formed Moon Township, to the Mooncrest residents who produced armor plates, munitions, and ships during World War II, to the aviation pioneers who opened our township to new businesses, Moon Township has enjoyed a long history of growth and prosperity.

I am confident speaking for the Township Board of Supervisors and staff to say, we take our responsibilities seriously. Our 2023 budget allows us to continue with capital improvements, maintain our street program, plan for stormwater improvements, provide the highest levels of safety, and enhance parks and recreation programming. But what is truly noteworthy, this is done while maintaining the current tax millage rate of 2.74 for the past nine years.

GOVERNMENT OVERVIEW

The Township of Moon is a second-class township form of government, governed by five elected Supervisors and an appointed Township Manager.

The Board of Supervisors' regular public meeting begins at 6:00 PM on the first Wednesday of the month in the Municipal Building auditorium at 1000 Beaver Grade Road. Workshop sessions begin at 6:00 PM on the last Wednesday of the month. Both meetings are open to the public. The Board of Supervisors' regular public meeting is broadcast live on Moon Area Government TV on Comcast channel 14 or Verizon channel 37. The meetings are rebroadcast throughout the month on MAG-TV. Visit <u>moongovtv.us</u> for times or to watch a recording online.

HISTORY

Origin

Moon Township has evolved significantly since its beginnings as a farm-based community. As one of the seventh original townships in Allegheny County, founded in 1788, Moon Township had a total area of 143 square miles. Some reports indicate that it would take one man on horseback two days to travel from one end of the community to the other. This geographically large township eventually spawned into 55 smaller municipalities, including the current neighboring townships of North Fayette, Findlay, Crescent, and the borough of Coraopolis.

In its early days, settlers depended heavily on the hunting and farming economy for survival. The excess of farm production at the end of the 18th century brought about a need for industries such as gristmills, sawmills, and fulling mills. By 1803, the Industrial Revolution had arrived, and the township continued to experience significant economic growth into the 20th century when roadways and railroads opened Moon as an attractive place for people to settle and raise their families. Both the Sewickley Bridge, which was originally constructed in 1911, and the Pennsylvania & Lake Erie Railroad contributed significantly to the township's

tremendous population growth.

During World War II, a production boom created a great housing need for workers stationed at factories on Neville Island and along the Ohio River which led to the U.S. government building the Mooncrest neighborhood.

Growth

Moon Township's largest percentage of growth came in 1952 when the Greater Pittsburgh Airport, later named Pittsburgh International Airport, was completed. One year later, construction on the Penn Lincoln Parkway was complete, making the commute to downtown Pittsburgh from Moon Township possible in about 20 minutes. These two large development projects contributed to a population increase of 24 percent between 1950 and 1957. They also led to a housing boom that created more than 1,250 homes in a decade-long period.


The township faced some challenges in the early 1990s when the airport relocated to Findlay Township. At that time, the Moon Township Board of Supervisors developed a forwardthinking plan that would help sustain growth. Although Moon lost a great source for business development, the township continued to experience growth. Today it's home to many highprofile national corporations, including Chevron, Eaton, FedEx Corporate Office, Calgon Carbon, Michael Baker, Nova Chemicals, ServiceLink, and McKesson, as well as several military installations including the U.S. Air Force 911th Airlift Wing and the U.S. Army Reserve 316th Sustainment Command. The highly ranked Moon Area School District provides opportunities for a lifetime of learning. Also, Moon Township serves as the home of Robert Morris University, which has a very strong business curriculum and educates nearly 5,500 students annually.



Members of the Moon Township Board of Supervisors and the administration continue to market this community as an exciting place to start or develop any type of business. Moon Township has a rich history as an economically strong community and hopes to continue to experience growth that will keep the tax-base strong while maintaining green space and allowing the township to offer a variety of services to its residents.





REFUSE AND RECYCLING SERVICE

Weekly Refuse and Recycling Curbside Pickups

The Moon Township Municipal Authority (MTMA) manages refuse and recycling for single-family residences and some multifamily properties. Waste Management is a contracted solid-waste and recycling company. Fees are based on a bid through the South Hills Area Council of Governments (SHACOG).

Refuse and recycling pickups occur on the same day. Collection days vary by neighborhood. Contact MTMA at **412.264.4300** to find out the day for your neighborhood. Pickups will be delayed by one day when a holiday occurs on a weekday. (certain holidays)

Annual Recycling Day June 3, 2022 8 AM - 1 PM Public Works Garage 1115 Stevenson Mill Road Moon Township's Environmental Advisory Council (EAC) hosts a series of electronics recycling events throughout the year to collect unused and unwanted electronic items such as printers, copiers, computers, laptops, and televisions. This is open to all communities. No businesses.

The EAC, with the assistance of community volunteers, hosts an annual recycling day typically on the first Saturday of June to help keep reusable items out of landfills. Eligible items include usable construction materials, household appliances, electronics, some home healthcare items, and tires (for a fee). Check out the flyer for specifics. Yard Waste Collections

The Moon Township Public Works Department offers curbside yard waste and tree branch pickup service in the spring and fall. Pickups follow residents' regular garbage collection. Place items at the curb no later than 8:00 AM on pickup day. Residents are asked to place waste in biodegradable paper bags. No plastic bags or boxes will be accepted. Branches should not exceed six feet in length and four inches in diameter and should not be bundled or tied. Watch for dates to be posted on **moontwp.us**.

Residents may drop off yard waste, following the same guidelines stated above, to be composted at the Moon Park. The composting program provides free mulch and compost to residents. Bring your containers and take as much as you need. Residents dropping off yard waste or picking up compost are asked to notify Public Works before arrival by calling **412.262.1700**.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Moon Township Volunteer Fire Company (MTVFC) operates from four fire stations strategically located throughout the township.

MTVFC is always looking for new members to join them in serving and protecting the community. To encourage volunteerism, the township offers a Volunteer Service Credit program for fire company volunteers. The program provides an annual real property tax credit of 20 percent to each certified, active volunteer who meets the specified requirements. The Township also participates in a FEMA Safer Grant which pays stipends for firefighters

Accreditation

We are a state-accredited Fire Department with more than 50% of our active members Certified Fire Fighter 1, one member is Certified 2, and 3 Fire Fighters Certified Instructors through the Pennsylvania State Fire Academy. We have over 70% of our Department members who are State Certified in Vehicle Rescue, Trench Rescue, and Confined Space Rescue. Six members are participants with the SHACOG Tactical Rescue Team and Certified in several additional rescue concepts, High and Low Angle Rope Rescue, Water Rescue, and Heavy Vehicle Rescue.

Currently, we operate 15 pieces of equipment, 3 Trucks, a 102 ft ladder, an 85 ft Snorkel, a 75-foot ladder, 5 Engines, 1 Heavy Rescue, 1 Brush Truck, 4 squad units, 1 Gator 6x6 all-terrain vehicle and trailer, 1 command unit, with additional support trailers, 1 Region 13, a Decon Trailer, 1 Trench Rescue Trail, and 1 Command Trailer. This past year the fire department purchased a special service vehicle that will be used for traffic accident management as well as being utilized for towing our various Township-owned trailers. (ex. Emergency trailers, Decon Trailer, Command Trailer, Trench Rescue Trailer)

EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICE

Valley Ambulance Authority

Valley Ambulance Authority (VAA) provides emergency medical services and medical transportation services to Moon Township and surrounding communities. The combined fleet of emergency vehicles includes seven ambulances, four special service/wheelchair vans, and a paramedic/supervisor response vehicle. All VAA paramedics and emergency medical technicians are certified by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and attend rigorous continuing education classes throughout the year.

VAA is a non-profit municipal authority and is primarily supported by subscription fees, insurance payments, and donations. VAA does not receive any municipal tax revenue and is an IRS-designated 501 (c)3 charitable organization. For more information, visit <u>www.valleyamb.org.</u>

VAA offers comprehensive American Heart Association (AHA) certified training programs including CPR and First Aid for the general public, health care professionals, community groups, sports teams, and businesses of all sizes.

The Moon Township Community Development Department is responsible for the coordination and implementation of all land development, property improvement, and code enforcement regulations within Moon Township.

Planning Department

Zoning Department

Some of the key functions of Community Development include enforcement of the Zoning Code, the Property Maintenance Code, rental inspections, and responding to citizens' concerns related to such matters. Additional information and documents concerning these subjects can all be found on the Moon Township website, **www.moontwp.us**, or by contacting Moon Township Zoning and Code Enforcement Officer, Amber Paxton.

The purpose of the Community Development Department is to facilitate and manage sustainable development in Moon Township that meets the needs of individual property owners and the Township within the parameters of the comprehensive plan and the Township Code of Ordinances. This is to be accomplished through dynamic land-use regulations, thorough inspections, community involvement, and excellent internal and external communication. The Department strives to enhance the physical environment and improve the quality of life for all residents, commercial businesses, and visitors.

The Board of Supervisors adopted the updated Moon Township Comprehensive Plan in April of 2015. This document is a guide that shapes the direction of the community's preservation and development activities and establishes community development policies. The plan defines the document's vision and aspirations and outlines a roadmap to assist the community in making decisions about its future. You can access this document from the Moon Township website.

The Community Development Department staff serves as liaison to the following Boards and Commissions that help guide development in the Township: Planning Commission, Zoning Hearing Board, Historical and Architectural Review Board (HARB), and the Environmental Advisory Council (EAC). Any subdivisions, land developments, or conditional use applications a re administered by staff and presented to the Planning Commission for their recommendation. The Zoning Hearing Board conducts public hearings for variance and special exception applications. The HARB makes recommendations to the Board of Supervisors regarding the Mooncrest historic district and the preservation of the Township's historic resources. The EAC provides advice to the Township on environmental issues and develops programs promoting green initiatives and best management practices.

The Community Development Department processes building permit requests and conducts building inspections. Always contact the Building Inspector before starting a project to determine if you are required to obtain a permit. Permits are required for all new building construction, additions, sheds, swimming pools, decks, porches, garages, fireplaces, electric systems, new driveways, and other projects as listed in the Pennsylvania Uniform Construction Code and the Moon Township Code of Ordinances. Other key functions include enforcement of the zoning code(s), the Property Maintenance Code, and responding to citizen concerns related to such matters. PUBLIC WORKS

The Moon Township Department of Public Works is responsible for the maintenance of all township-owned roads, properties, and buildings. Approximately 24 road employees, a Public Works Facilities Manager, and a Public Works Operations Manager make up the road department. The Department of Public Works saves Moon Township thousands of dollars annually in construction and maintenance costs by offering several services in-house. These services include:

Citizen Request System

Moon Parks and Recreation offers residents of Moon and surrounding communities a diverse array of leisure opportunities throughout the seasons.

Parks

With a strong emphasis on sustainability, maintaining green space, and connecting people to nature, Moon Parks and Recreation oversees 600+ acres of park space with groomed trails in three parks: Moon, Robin Hill, and Olson. The parks offer many amenities including basketball, tennis, baseball fields, soccer fields, sand volleyball, pickleball, playgrounds, an amphitheater, a fishing pond, picnic shelters, playgrounds, and the Clearview FCU splash pad. Moon Parks and Recreation also offers a variety of programming for people of all ages, including seasonal special events, fitness, sports, educational, arts and crafts, and summer camp.

To provide children, youth, and their families with a safe, smoke-free environment, all Moon Township parks, fields, playgrounds, and recreational areas are tobacco-free zones. This includes all forms of smokeless tobacco, vaping, and e-cigarettes.



Trail System

Moon Township is home to nearly 20 miles of multiuse trails. People of all ages and skill levels can enjoy walking, hiking, and biking on the well-maintained, clearly marked trails. Pets on leashes are welcome, but all-terrain vehicles (ATVs) are not permitted. The township is working to connect neighborhoods near Moon, Robin Hill, and Olson parks to the trail system. Efforts are also underway to link township trails and greenspaces to those owned and maintained by the Montour Trail Council, the Ohio River Trail Council, and Hollow Oak Land Trust. We are always looking to partner with volunteers on trail development and maintenance. New maps are now available online at **moonparks.org**.

Programming

Moon Township's elected property tax collector is John Wink. Under Pennsylvania law, the property tax collector is the independent collecting agent for a municipality and school district. The tax collector does not set property assessment values, tax millage rates, or collection due dates. The tax collector cannot reduce penalties or delinquent fees. He cannot accept payments once the property has been turned over to the delinquent tax collecting agency.

The current tax rates an due dates are as follows:

Moon Township Property Tax - 2.74 mills (2023)

January - December | Calendar Year

Township property tax bills are mailed April 1 of each year. If you do not receive yours by April 15, please call the tax office to request it. You will receive a 2% discount on the property tax if paid by May 31. Township taxes must be paid at face from June 1 – July 31. After July 31, a 10% penalty applies until December 31

Moon Area School District Tax - 22.6746 mills (2022)

July 1 - June 30 | Fiscal Year

School District property tax bills are mailed July 1 of each year. If you do not receive yours by July 15, please call the tax office to request it. You will receive a 2% discount if the school property tax is paid by August 31. School taxes must be paid at face from September 1 – October 31. After October 31, a 10 penalty applies until December 31. An optional installment plan based on the face amount is available for School property taxes only. Pay the 1st installment as shown on the tax bill by August 31. Coupons for the other 3 payments will be mailed. Those payments are due September 30, October 31, and November 30. A 10% penalty is added to installment payments that are late. After December 31, any unpaid taxes are turned over to the delinquent tax collector where additional fees and interest will be added to the penalty amount. Under Pennsylvania law, failure to receive a tax bill does not change the obligation to pay the taxes on time. The Tax Collector does not have the authority to waive penalties.



Homeowners that qualify should apply for the homestead exemption through Allegheny County. Exemptions will take effect for the current calendar year if the application is received before March 1. The Moon Township Property Tax Office is responsible for collecting real estate property taxes which includes both township and school. Jordan Tax Service is the appointed agent who will be processing tax payments in 2-23. Their number for property tax questions is **412.731.2311.** This office does not collect wage taxes. All wage tax questions should be directed to the current collector agency, Jordan Tax Service, at 412.835.5243 or call the Moon Township Municipal Building at **412.262.1700** for more information.

The Township's Citizen Request System allows residents to submit their questions, comments, or concerns to township officials online. This feature allows residents to track the resolution of their comments through ongoing e-mail updates ensuring a timely response from moon township staff. Amazon Alexa and Google Assistant

Moon Township collaborated with Amazon Alexa and Google Assistant to bring voice-activated e-gov to residents' households. This will allow users to download the skill of "Make it Moon" through their Alexa or Google app and then speak to their device to ask about happenings in Moon Township.

This feature allows users to find out when events are going on by asking questions such as "when is trick or treat?" or "what do I do with my tree limbs?" while in the "Make it Moon" skill. Also, it can be used like the e-gov service offered through the municipality website to ask questions, post comments, or report concerns.
